

Historic Western Suburb Tree Grant

Tree Characteristics

Japanese Tree Lilac

Blooms in May, with large off-white flowers.
Has a 2 to 4 inch long leaf that is 1 to 3” wide.
May be \$5 to \$15 more expensive than the others.



Winter King Hawthorne

Blooms in May with 2” clusters of 3/4” white blossoms.
Has a 1/4 to 1/2” brilliant red fruit from October until February.

When the fruit ripens, it attracts robins, mockingbirds, and cardinals who devour the fruit in a couple of days – before it ever hits the ground.

(Is not a good nesting tree, so starlings are NOT attracted to them.)

Green glossy leaves are 3/4” to 2-1/4” long.

Golden yellow leaves in the fall.

Generally known to be hardy.



Yoshino Flowering Cherry

Blooms in March-April with stunning white to pink blossoms.

(Think Washington, D.C. and Macon, Georgia.)

(3000 of these were first given to the US in 1912 by the Japanese government.)

Grows quickly and lasts for 15 to 20 years or longer.



Snow Goose Flowering Cherry

Blooms in March-April with
Brilliant white blossoms.



Kwanzan Flowering Cherry

Blooms in March-April
Double pink blossom.
